If you plan to paint the exterior trim of your home this year, please be aware that only certain colors are permitted under the architectural guidelines. Ideally, you will be keeping the original color -- and if so, you do not have to submit an Architectural Change Application. But if you do wish to change the color of your trim, please choose your color from the following list (and submit a Change Application to the Board before you buy the paint!).

The colors listed below are McCormick; if you wish to use another brand, please submit a copy of the manufacturer's color chart with your Application.
